Four state legislators who represent Northbrook will address the business community at this year's annual Legislative Lunch. Illinois Senators Daniel Biss (D-9) and Julie Morrison (D-29) along with Representatives Laura Fine (D-17) and Robyn Gabel (D-18) will discuss their top legislative priorities, comment on the State's protracted budget crisis, and share their thoughts on how additional revenue can be generated. Following their remarks,

the legislators will answer guest questions.

Creating a stable environment for citizens and businesses is a priority for Sen. Morrison. "The state has lurched from crisis to crisis, which has led to uncertainty," comments Morrison. "We should be making it easier for everyone." Sen. Morrison introduced legislation recently to create a one stop shop business portal to help individuals start new businesses and help current owners manage their licenses. Commenting that there is no consensus on what new revenue will look like, she states "I think there will be a broader approach; it's clear we cannot continue to rely solely on income taxes." In office for 3 1/2 years, Sen. Morrison serves as Vice Chair of the Human Services Committee and Chair of the Subcommittee on DCFS Special Issues.

## AMC Proposes Luxury Theater Experience For Northbrook Court

Village Trustees enthusiastically endorsed a proposed new luxury theater experience at Northbrook Court, with high end, 60 inch power reclining seats in all 14 existing auditoriums, and an expanded concession area to allow movie goers to enjoy an alcoholic beverage.

The changes, proposed by American Multi-Cinema (AMC) were recently outlined to Village Board members. For the project to proceed the 1995 special permit ordinance which sets specific conditions for the

operation of the Northbrook Court theaters will need to be amended. Because of the size of the luxury seating, the renovations will reduce the theatres capacity by two thirds from 3,350 to 1,184. Changes also include an updated concessions area with the installation of new kitchen equipment, projection and sound upgrades, along with lobby and box office improvements. A MacGuffins bar is to be installed to support service of alcoholic beverages to adult customers.

Sen. Biss recently introduced legislation to require greater transparency about undisclosed investment fees charged to public pension funds. "Disclosure of these fees will lead to better decision making and perhaps healthier competition for the pension funds' business," he notes. Biss has served in the Senate since 2013. He chairs the Human Services Committee and serves on several committees with oversight over financial matters, including Appropriations, Financial Institutions, and Revenue.

A strong advocate for universal health care and environmental sustainability, Rep. Gabel is the primary co-sponsor of the Clean Jobs bill which aims to increase energy efficiency and reduce energy use by 20% by 2025. To

generate revenue, "I think a change to our state's constitution that allows for a graduated rate income tax would be a more fair tax system for the people of Illinois," she comments. "This system would follow the lead of the federal tax system and the tax systems of almost every other state in the country." Gable, who has been in office for 6 years, serves as the Chair of the House Human Services Committee, the Vice Chair of the House Human Services Appropriations committee and on several other committees dealing with insurance, small business empowerment and workforce development.

Rep. Laura Fine lists higher education, patients' rights and economic development as her legislative priorities. "I believe broadening

## Downtown Starbucks Expands Menu to Include Alcohol

Northbrook's downtown Starbucks has a new look to go with its expanded menu that now includes light bites along with a selection of wines and craft beer. The "Starbucks Evening Menu" is offered Monday through Friday from 2:00 p.m. until 8:30 p.m. and Saturdays and Sundays, noon to 8:30 p.m. The downtown store at 1931 Cherry Lane is the only Northbrook Starbucks location offering the Evenings menu.

"By expanding our offerings to include food and drinks that are more suitable for the evening hours, we are enhancing our role as a gathering place for the community throughout the day and into the evening," comments a Starbucks spokesperson.

The store also has a new layout to provide an inviting atmosphere for unwinding in the evening. "Designers focused on experiential elements such as innovative lighting, community tables that encourage conversations, soft seating, warm colors and local art."

The wine and craft beer menu includes selections that take into consideration local taste preferences. According to Starbucks, the Chicago area stores will offer locally brewed Goose Island and Goose IPA craft beers. A combination of local and regional favorites will rotate periodically.

The small plates include warm dishes meant to be sharable, ranging from Truffle Popcorn to flatbreads to bacon-wrapped dates. Starbucks notes that it worked side-by-side with its winery

partners to identify the small plate assortment to fit the uniqueness of the wine and beer menu. Despite the additional menu items, no changes were made to the kitchen area.

Northbrook is one of only 10 locations on the North Shore that now serves beer and wine. Starbucks officials comment that they consider a number of factors before selecting a store for the new menu. "We believe a coffee house should be welcoming, inviting and familiar place for people to connect and reflect the unique character of the neighborhoods they serve." Starbucks commented that it is in the very early stages of considering the Skokie Boulevard store for the Evening Menu.

AMC spokesperson Frank Lewis explained to the Board that the company plans to invest several million dollars in the upgrades. He pointed out that the traditional movie going experience peaked in 1990s when numerous large theaters, including Northbrook Court, were built to meet demand. With the Internet, tablets and TVs now able to stream movies, theaters find themselves outdated and unable to compete. "There's been a precipitous decline in attendance," he commented. With the changes, he hopes Northbrook Court can be turned from an aged asset to the crown jewel it once was.

Trustees embraced the proposal, determining that the changes were not significant enough to warrant the need for Plan Commission review. Instead they will hold their own public hearing prior to taking a final vote later this month.

"This is a wonderful thing to reinvest in this theater," commented Village Trustee Jim Karagianis. "These changes are obviously critically needed." Trustees all spoke in favor of the proposal, including Trustee Bob Israel who praised the thoroughness of the proposal and expressed gratitude to AMC for investing in Northbrook. Trustees were unanimous in their vote to take the plan to the next step, although Trustee Heller warned that just because they were in favor of the plan, that the changes are not minor. "This is the trend and I like the AMC experience, but these are significant changes to the special permit."

Trustees will need to separately approve a special liquor license category, after the permit changes are approved. Lewis noted in the AMC experience that on average, most movie goers only

consume one drink and that they enjoy a 97.4% compliance rate with enforcement. All of the trustees, when straw-pollled, said they favored awarding it.

According to AMC the project is expected to take three months once all the approvals have been granted. The construction will be done in phases with half the theater open while the other half is under construction. All of the renovation should be completed by the end of the year.

lobby, pre-function space as well as new look in the ballroom." Allgauer also hopes attendees will check out the beer garden on the newly landscaped patio that is now open seven days a week.

Ash Seth, 1818 Fine Men's Salons is looking forward to highlighting their new men's grooming business to a wider, hard to reach North Shore audience. "We plan to feature our handcrafted haircuts, straight edge razor shaves and other grooming services that we provide especially for men."

Similarly, the Bright Horizons team hopes to leverage the Expo to spotlight the programs and services they offer beyond traditional child care and preschool options, such as family resources, webinars, and back up care in the event regular child care arrangements break down or school is closed. "The Expo helps us communicate our entire brand," comments Michelle Milner.

Returning exhibitors appreciate the ability to build visibility for their business, and meet new customers without a huge time commitment. Helen Logarakis, Premier Custom Homes, is exhibiting for the third time. She comments, "the Chamber's Expo gets our name out there and gives people a way to get to know us, especially as we are



not always able to attend events." This year she will have a slide show along with a new give-away. Maggiano's Manager Brenda Wycykal adds, "I find there is a synergy in the room and I enjoy exchanging ideas with the other exhibitors. The event is always very well organized and well run."

By limiting the number of exhibitors to 63, it is easy for attendees to stop by and learn about each business. The Chamber organizes a fun scavenger hunt to encourage attendees to circulate the

room and check out as many exhibitors as possible while enjoying complimentary refreshments.

All exhibitors are provided with a 6 foot skirted table, postcards to help promote the event, a listing on all collateral material, including local newspaper ads, the Chamber newsletter and the website. 
