## Village Conducting Voltz Road Traffic Study

Over the next few months the Village will consider ways to improve traffic on Voltz Road including the ability to bike, walk and drive safely through neighborhood. At an Open House in September, Public Works staff and staff from the Village engineering contractor Gewalt Hamilton and Associates, unveiled some of their suggestions to address traffic concerns on the Voltz Road corridor. Comments from attendees at the meeting will be taken into consideration during the process of developing final recommendations to improve traffic flow on the road.

Voltz intersects Waukegan Road, which is a designated Truck route and a Regional Arterial Road, on the west. According to state classifications, Regional Arterial routes have 4 to 6 lanes with a traffic signal at major intersections and an allowable speed limit of up to 55 mph. To the east, Voltz abuts Sunset Ridge Road, which is classified as a Local Arterial road, where traffic signals or Stop signs control traffic, and where the allowable speed limit is 40 - 50 mph. Sandwiched in between, Voltz is classified as a Neighborhood Collector, one of the lowest classifications in terms of traffic, and where the speed limit is generally 25 - 30 mph, there are only 2 travel lanes,

## District 30 Weighing Referendum for School Improvements

Faced with numerous decisions about the future of an aging, outdated middle school as well as the need for additional classrooms at the two elementary schools to accommodate growing enrollment, Northbrook-Glenview School District 30 could bring a referendum to voters next spring.

A major concern with Maple School, which serves grades 6 - 8, is that the layout is not conducive to current, collaborative teaching methods. In addition, visitor and student foot traffic through the front of the school passes rooms where students receive special services, allowing little privacy. Additional space is needed for science classes which are currently held in general classrooms not containing the necessary amenities. There are also no opportunities for outdoor learning, STEM is in need of additional space, there are no flexible teaming areas and one of the gym needs significant renovation. On top of these deficiencies, there are numerous short and long-term maintenance needs totaling millions of dollars.

"We want to have facilities that support and enhance our instructional vision," comments School Supt. Brian Wegley, noting that the need to address Maple School deficiencies, which don't meet current learning standards is critical. "Teaching is now more collaborative and more engaged and there are so many great tools available, but our space has to support that," he adds. Middle schools need flexible space for collaborative learning, and the current space limits the ability to support emerging programs like STEM.

## Holiday Commercial Expands Reach to Digital Audience

and Stop signs are used.

Statistics show that traffic on Voltz has increased from an average of 2,150 cars a day in 2002 to 3,230 in 2015. While traffic along Waukegan Road has decreased during the same time period from 24,200 cars and trucks to 20,100, traffic on Sunset Ridge has increased from 6,400 to 7,350. One of the busiest intersections is at Voltz and Waukegan, where between 2011 and 2016 there were 30 accidents, over half of all the 56 accidents accounted for on Voltz.

Suggested changes include:

- At Voltz and Waukegan, (Anets Woods development) add westbound right-turn lane
- Consider traffic circle at Voltz and Grant
- Lower the speed limit to 25 mph between Bridlewood and Lawrence
- Consider Stop signs at sharp curves (where

there were 9 accidents between 2011 and 2016)

- Restripe between the sharp curves for 10-foot lanes (to reduce speed)
- Test traffic counts for all-way stop at Voltz and Sunset Ridge
- On Waukegan, add northbound left turn lane into Maple

Most expressed support for the added turn lanes, especially at the Anets Woods intersection, but there was concerns about the suggested traffic circle. All of the comments from the Open House will be shared with the Village Board's Public Works Committee, which will hold additional opportunities for public comment before making any final recommendations. At Westcott, a minimum of two additional classrooms are needed due to growing enrollment. Both Westcott and Willowbrook have space insufficiencies with learning taking place in hallways and no STEM lab space.

According to Wegley two approaches were originally considered: build a new middle school west of the existing district office, or renovate the current Maple School and address one phase of capacity issues at the elementary schools. It is important to note that if the decision was made not to pursue either of these approaches, District 30 would still need to invest about \$18 million in Health/Life Safety and general maintenance improvements at the three schools, most of which are at Maple School.

The school administration has already indicated its support for building a new school. In addition, a 35 member community Task Force also voted unanimously to support a new school, as well as phase 1 of the health/life safety issues and needed instructional space at the elementary school, totaling \$4 million. They voted to move forward and survey district voters, conduct building tours, and generally educate the community about the

building and educational needs. The Task Force reflects a cross section of the community with 40% parents of students and 60% non-parents. Rules set forth by the Task Force required two-thirds of the members to be in agreement on any final recommendation. Construction of a new school and the other school improvements would require a referendum vote.

Already the firm ARCON Architects has drawn up preliminary plans for a possible new middle school to replace the 67 year-old Maple School. The new building would increase square footage from 89,000 to 110,000. ARCON estimates the construction cost at \$40.6 million to build the new school, a process that could take up to 18 months, and would not disrupt learning in the current school. The old building would then be torn down and the campus would be updated with parking and a soccer field.

Estimates for remodeling Maple School to mirror most of what a new building would offer would have cost \$38.6 million, which is why that option is not being pursued. At a minimum, the school needs remodeling that would entail moving the front office to the northwest part of the building, remodeling

key areas, including the science labs where one lacks access to water and gas. Also two classrooms in the back of the school need updating, one of the gyms should be updated along with a bank of classrooms that “have all kinds of issues,” according to Wegley. This “compromise” remodeling would still run over \$24 million, but this approach was rejected by the Citizens’ Task Force

Dr. Wegley emphasized that the process of defining the district’s direction, “is designed to be respectful and inclusive of the community.”

In order to be on the ballot in April 2017, a decision would have to be made by the School Board before the January filing date. If the deadline is missed, or a decision is made not to go to referendum, the next opportunity to have a referendum would not be until March 2018.

target adult viewers on a variety of different networks including USA, TBS, AMC, HGTV, CNN, BRAVO and ESPN. The spot will also receive airtime during key NCAA football and basketball games.

In addition, the ad will also be seen on websites and mobile devices. It’s no secret that consumers are turning more and more to their mobile devices, particularly their smartphones and tablets to watch TV and video. Statistics show that 71% of adults ages 18 - 34 watch TV online or on mobile devices. Taking advantage of Comcast’s new multi-media advertising options, the Northbrook commercial will have the potential to pop up on over 400 network related websites. The ads will be “non-skippable,” which means the viewer must watch the ad entirely before their requested video will continue.

The commercial is scheduled to run

five weeks beginning the Sunday before Thanksgiving until just before December 25th. The commercial is expected to make nearly 300,000 impressions on the targeted audience of women ages 35 - 65.

## New Partnerships Formed Through Chamber Connections

*One of the Chamber's greatest strengths is offering members the opportunity to make new connections and form partnerships with each other.*

At the Chamber's meal packing program last year, amidst the happy chaos of packing, stacking and assembling thousands of meals by enthusiastic volunteers, Henry Fetta looked around, and in his words "the wheels in my head starting turning." He realized that there were obvious synergies with his organization Hunger Resource Network (HRN) and Feed6, the agency behind the event. "I felt there was a natural connection to be made between us and Feed6, because of our common goal to serve the hungry," he commented.

Through an introduction by Chamber President Tensley Garris, Henry and HRN President Dan Jariabka began discussing mutual interest with Bill Kanetas and Chris Coyne at Feed6. "We felt we could provide them with some consistent distribution connections with recipient agencies," commented Henry. Because of this new relationship, the Chamber meal packing event took a new turn. Feed6 worked with HRN to distribute all 50,000 meals to Pacific Garden Missions, Chicago's largest soup kitchen serving the homeless, made possible by HRN's contacts there.

But it wasn't only Henry who made connections at the meal packing event.

Deepa Shankar, a UL volunteer at the Chamber event a few years ago, recognized that Feed6 could assist with UL efforts to help victims from Superstorm Sandy. She immediately brought the idea to Tina Vaughn at UL, who helped set up a meal packing event at UL for employees. "Much of the food packaged went directly to the victims of the storm," notes Tina. "Our first meal packing event was so popular that we decided to make it a tradition."

"Without a doubt the networking of the Northbrook Chamber has been amazing," comments Bill Kanetas. "From UL alone, we have packed over 200,000 meals. All of that would have not been possible without the Chamber."

The networking has continued to evolve. Now HRN is teaming up with UL to do a joint event that will have even more impact. On Saturday, November 12th, UL has agreed to allow HRN to use its Northbrook campus as their distribution point for its annual Community Outreach

Day. A hundred volunteers from the community will help load 126,000 pounds of frozen chicken into vehicles from more than 80 agencies, a process made easier by the use of the expansive UL parking lot. Inside, UL volunteers will be working with Feed6 to pack 50,000 pasta meals. As the event coincides with Veterans Day, both have agreed that they want most of the food to go to agencies that support veterans, again using the HRN connections.

"It is so rewarding to work with two awesome organizations on the common cause of feeding the hungry in Northern Illinois, and to be doing something to help our veterans," comments Vaughn.

Feed6 organizers have also benefited from Chamber members stepping up to help their cause. "Several of our Core Volunteers are Chamber members - including Lynn
