Village Considers Sports Complex In Sky Harbor Business Park

Village Trustees recently weighed in on a proposal submitted by North Shore Sports and Wellness (NSSW) to locate a multi-use sports complex at a property in the Sky Harbor Business park at 555 Huehl Road. NSSW proposes redeveloping the existing 78,500 square foot building to accommodate the relocation of Joy of the Game and several other sports related businesses and a school that they currently operate in Deerfield.

Previously, NSSW had considered a site in Sky Harbor at 3401 Commercial Ave. but Trustees and neighboring property owners voiced major concerns regarding the amount of parking during peak hours of operation and large events. Concerns were also raised with large trucks operating in Sky Harbor around the clock, while the proposed uses involve children and increased car traffic at the site.

The primary use of the building would be Joy of the Game, a membership sports and recreation club serving all ages. Plans would include raising the roof to accommodate the four basketball/volleyball courts used by various organizations for different sports programming including

Volunteers Needed for August 30th Meal Packing Event

For the seventh year in a row, the Chamber is pleased to again sponsor the annual Meal Packing event, offering members an opportunity to give back to the community and to help fight hunger. On Thursday, August 30, over 250 Chamber volunteers are needed to help assemble 40,000 meals for distribution through a partnership formed with the Hunger Resource Network and the Chicago Metropolitan division of the Salvation Army. The packaged pasta meals will be delivered to food banks and soup kitchens and will feed thousands of individuals and families.

"The success of our fundraisers, the Golf Outing and Auction & Taste, makes it possible for us to hold this event again this year," comments Board Chair Glenn Weintraub. "And of all the events AA Service participates in, this one is one of our favorites. I know other Chamber members feel the same and look forward to this every year."

The Chamber is organizing the event through a partnership with Feed 6-Outreach, a charitable organization that specializes in mobile meal packing events. Feed 6-Outreach will provide the ingredients for specially fortified macaroni and cheese dinner packets that will be filled, sealed and boxed up for delivery on a 10 – 12 person



assembly line. Each packet will provide enough ingredients to feed 6 people.

Held in the ballroom graciously donated by the Hilton Chicago Northbrook, the event will be energized with lively music provided by local D.J. Charizma. Light refreshments and beverages will be provided for workers at each shift. Every year the event fosters camaraderie and friendly competitiveness.

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Applications Underway for 32nd Leadership Northbrook Class

The Chamber's Leadership Northbrook, an eight session program that offers a comprehensive, firsthand look at the inner workings of Northbrook, will be offered again starting this fall. The program features presentations from top level civic, business and government officials, along with private tours of some of the Village's landmark businesses and community resources.

Modeled after a program begun in Atlanta over 45 years ago, Leadership Northbrook's goal is to deepen the

understanding of the resources and challenges facing the Village and the North Shore region, while establishing networks among emerging leaders.

The half day sessions are scheduled on the second Friday of each month starting next month (September) and continuing through April. The class kicks off with a driving tour of important Northbrook landmarks and is held at a different location each month, including the Historical Society, Village Hall, Techny Towers, Glenbrook

Northbrook Court Set to Open New Play Space

Families will find new places for kids of all ages to play and explore when making the trip to Northbrook Court this fall. Northbrook Play, a new 4,000 square foot museum-quality children's experience is expected to open soon, offering interactive stations for kids of all ages to play, imagine and explore. The whimsical, nature-themed play area will be free of charge for guests.

Located on the second floor, near the famous Northbrook Court tree house, the space was created in partnership with the Chicago Children's Museum and Luci Creative, a Chicago-based full-service museum master planning and exhibit design firm.

Similar to a children's museum exhibit, Northbrook Play will offer a variety of different

play zones for different age groups and interests, including areas for kids to dress up, places to climb, a nest for pre-walkers to explore, a terrain area, workshop, hideouts and a family room. "The space is intended to instill confidence in young guests as they interact with the different areas," according to the official announcements. A special feature of the space will be the constant rearrangement of objects so that the space changes by the hour, so each time a visitor returns, it will be a new experience.

Stroller parking space will be available, as well as a lounge space for caregivers to relax. A workshop area will offer program-ready space for facilitated events and activities for children of all ages.

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Village, Illinois Tollway Plan Summer Road Improvement Projects

Drivers will need to exercise caution and allow a few extra minutes for possible detour routes when planning to travel through sections of Northbrook this summer. Construction is planned in the downtown and also on the Edens Expressway Spur.

Shermer Road Bridge

Starting in mid-August, a three-month construction project on the Shermer Road Bridge in downtown Northbrook will commence, requiring all traffic to be re-routed around the construction site at Church Street and Village Green Park.

Originally scheduled for February, the project was delayed due to utility relocation. The repair is needed as the concrete beams on the bridge that carry traffic on Shermer Road over the West Fork of the North branch of the Chicago River have reached the end of their useful life. While the bridge remains safe for pedestrian and vehicle traffic, routine inspections performed on the bridge identified deterioration on the underside of several of the concrete bridge beams.

As the scope of the work involves

the removal of the bridge deck, Shermer Road will be closed to thru traffic between Meadow Road and Church Street. The posted detour route will direct traffic to Waukegan Road, Founders Drive and Techny Road.

Commuter parking lots will not be affected, and on-street parking between Meadow and the bridge will still be allowed. In addition, Village Green Park and businesses in the downtown will remain open and accessible to pedestrians. Equipment will not be staged outside of the construction zone.

The construction cost for the project is approximately \$1.1 million and is 80% funded through an IDOT grant. For more information on the project visit www.northbrook.il.us/shermerbridge. Follow the prompts to sign up for the e-mail updates.

Edens Spur

In June, the Illinois Tollway began a multi-year repair and reconstruction project of the Edens Expressway Spur (I-94). Current repair work includes removing and

replacing segments of the existing concrete pavement and resurfacing the frontage road off of Waukegan Road.

In 2019 the work will become more intensive as Pfingsten Road bridge will be closed for repair for four months as will the Waukegan Road ramps for two months. The work will also include storm water improvements and new roadway lighting. The project is scheduled to be completed in 2020.

Originally constructed in 1958, the Spur consists of two lanes in each direction, carrying up to 57,000 vehicles daily. According to the Illinois Tollway Authority, "These repairs are necessary to extend the life of the roadway and provide safe and convenient travel for Tollway customers." The work is part of the Tollway's 15 year \$14 billion capital program to improve the Illinois Tollway.

floor hockey, soccer, basketball, baseball, football and volleyball. Six other stand-alone businesses would also be located on the site, some offering personal training physical therapy and the Felicity School, a secondary school program for 25 children with special needs.

In addition, national sports tournaments and other special events are expected to draw in over 600 people on weekends. Last year 34 tournaments were held, mostly smaller events with 15 considered large. "While a thousand people may be in attendance throughout the day, at any one time we do not expect to utilize over 200 parking spots," according to NSSW.

Village staff preliminary analysis of parking showed that 157 parking spaces would be needed during peak hours of operation during the weekdays, with a potential need for 224 parking spaces on weekends.

Currently the site includes 150 parking stalls as well as a loading dock. By re-striping the parking lot and eliminating the

loading dock, parking would be increased to accommodate a total of 168 cars, according to NSSW. To address potential parking concerns, valet parking on the north side of the building would allow a total of 190 - 200 cars on the site. Additional parking could add around 9 spots on the eastern part of the building, but would also require a variation.

The site is currently zoned I-1, Restricted Industrial District and would need to be rezoned to IB Institutional Building District; several special permits and variations would also need to be granted. The future land use map in the 2010 Comprehensive Plan designates the property as appropriate for General Industrial, Warehouse and Office uses.

"This is a community-based business whose purpose is important," comments Mike Nekrtiz with NSSW. He noted that the site would allow the Felicity School, which currently operates in a 4,000 square foot building to expand to 12,000 square feet in the new space. He reiterated that there would be no bus traffic into the site and that the parking issues have been addressed.

Trustees generally voiced support for the business coming to Northbrook, but continued to express concerns about parking and truck traffic. All commented that they preferred the Huehl site over the previous location, but said they would defer to the Plan Commission with regard to whether there is sufficient parking and whether the valet parking is feasible.

"This is a reasonable use for this space," commented Trustee Karagianis who said his top concerns were the need for a traffic study to see how nearby Solomon Schechter School would be affected and making sure the building sprinklers are up to code. Trustee Ciesla commented that the issue of loading and unloading kids should also be looked at to ensure safety.

"I would love to see this business come to Northbrook," commented Trustee Collison, but has concerns about snow removal and staff parking.

The Plan Commission is expected to consider the NSSW proposal once additional parking and traffic studies have been conducted.

North High School, and Glenbrook Hospital. Tours of prominent businesses are also on the agenda, including UL, Bernhard Woodwork, Northbrook Court and Highland Baking.

The class is limited to 20 participants and allows for learning and exchange in an informal setting. Topics covered in the Leadership program include an overview of Northbrook's rich history, an explanation of municipal government, planning and zoning issues, opportunities and challenges of the Northbrook business climate; transportation highlights, educational resources, and life safety services. One of the most popular sessions is a visit to the Park District's Teams Challenge Course at Meadowhill Park, which involves fun exercises that help participants get to know each other as well as identify leadership traits.

The class offers an in-depth view of Northbrook's resources that often comes as a surprise to long-time residents. "I have lived in Northbrook half of my life and yet I learned so many interesting things through Leadership," comments Tom Len, Tom Len Custom Homes. "The sessions kept me interested, engaged, and eagerly looking forward to the next session. I would recommend this program to anyone who wants to learn a lot about Northbrook."

The class is also a valuable resource to those who are new to the community, helping them make contacts. "As I was new to the area and working in Northbrook, Leadership

was invaluable to me to begin to understand the community," reflects Maggie Thomann, Northbrook Public Library. "I was amazed at the wealth of resources, vibrant businesses and active organizations that I learned about through the program.

It was very helpful to meet others working in the schools, Park District, business community and Village. I have already been able to make connections that I hope will lead to further partnerships."

"I found the program to be incredibly educational on the many things that happen to keep the Village running on a day-to-day basis," comments Rob McElligott, Wood Oaks Jr. High. "As a school principal, making connections with the leaders in the Village including Chamber President Tensley Garris, Police Chief Adkins, Fire Chief Carlson, Village board members and local business leaders was very beneficial. It is important for public schools to be a part of the community at large, and getting to know other leaders opens the door to many possible learning opportunities for our students."

Many graduates of the program go on to serve in leadership roles in the community. "The Leadership program was

a great experience and helped me learn about Northbrook's best kept secret - the many successful businesses that support our community and tax base," comments Ron Goldblatt, NorthShore Loyalty & Mobile Solutions. "On a personal note, the Leadership program has taken me to the next step in being involved with the community as I recently was appointed to the Industrial and Commercial Development Commission (ICDC)."

Leadership is open to anyone, whether a long-time Chamber member or a new employee at a business or an area resident. Northbrook residency is not required. Spaces fill up quickly every year so early sign-up is encouraged.

Members are encouraged to register for one of the two shifts, 11:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m. or 4:30 p.m. – 6:30 p.m. At each shift volunteers will be assigned a single task, either measuring the ingredients, filling the plastic pouches, sealing them, or loading the boxes.

The Chamber is purchasing the supplies for the initial 40,000 meals, however additional contributions will make it possible to package even more meals. At a cost of \$.25 per meal, even a small \$10.00 donation will add 40 meals to the total. Advance donations are encouraged so that Outreach can plan ahead and provide enough supplies.

North High School in July 1998 and moved into the position of Superintendent in 2008. Making the announcement, School Board President Skip Shein commented that under Riggle's leadership the District has witnessed unprecedented growth in student achievement, employee satisfaction, and financial stability. "Mike has worked tirelessly to deepen critical relationships with our feeder elementary districts, park districts, religious and cultural organizations, and the villages of Glenview and Northbrook," he added. Throughout his tenure as superintendent, the district maintained high levels of academic achievement, including a record high ACT composite score average in 2017 and a district graduation rate of 97%. District officials anticipate beginning the search process for Dr. Riggle's successor in September.
