## Northbrook Development Projects Advancing

Construction abounds in Northbrook as many projects that were recently approved by the Village Board have broken ground or are nearly complete. Numerous other projects are under review, await formal approval, or anticipate completion in the near future:

### Dunwood Subdivision, 2600 Dundee and 759 Greenwood

A tentative plat approval for seven single family homes on 2.03 acres was issued and final engineering is underway. Once the engineering plans are submitted for final approval, the final plat will be presented to the Plan Commission and the Board of Trustees. Site work and construction can commence after those steps are completed.

### Grainger property, 1657 Shermer Road

The 10.3 acre site previously occupied by Grainger is now officially under Village ownership. According to Village sources, preliminary discussions with Metra on the many technical issues associated with the possibility of moving the train station are underway. Estimates are that moving the station would increase the commuter parking by approximately 20 percent and reduce the amount of time that Shermer Road is blocked from trains stopped in the downtown. Once those are resolved a decision would need to be made about a detailed feasibility study and cost analysis.

### Green Acres, 916 Dundee Road

According to managing partner David Kahnweiler, GA Northbrook LLC, things are in a preliminary stage for the future of the 127 acre property. "We are in the exploration phase in an effort to determine demand of various uses and will subsequently develop a land plan reflecting same. Unfortunately, we do not have a timetable at this point but would encourage any feedback or

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## Hunger Free Northbrook Initiative Begins to Take Action

Imagine a community where a central resource could guide people who are food insecure - especially children and seniors - to the help that they need and where food waste is minimized. That vision might seem far-fetched to some, but it is actually moving forward in Northbrook, thanks to the Hunger Resource Network's (HRN) "Hunger Free Northbrook" initiative, where community stakeholders, including the Northbrook Chamber, are taking practical steps to make Northbrook a food secure community.

Thanks to a grant received from the Alliance to End Hunger, HRN has been working with over 80 leaders from across the community this past year including the Chamber, educators, businesses, health care professionals, media, religious organizations, civic leaders and others to launch a series of projects with the goal of making Northbrook a hunger free community. HRN leader Henry Fetta estimates that there are now over 50 people actively involved, including a number of

Chamber members, working together on several identified projects.

The group conducted a community analysis, brainstormed ideas, surveyed different populations and came up with a number of solutions, according to Fetta. Research identified that the populations most at risk of being food insecure are children and seniors. It also identified gaps in programs and services for those in need. As a result, the group whittled down 27 solutions to 6 projects.

"We are excited to be moving into the action stage, beginning to implement the first wave of solutions identified by the stakeholders to improve the food security of our residents," Fetta comments. "The goals are for these programs to evolve, grow and become ongoing services that Northbrook provides for those in need and to add new solutions as people become

available to lead them."

Already underway is an initiative at Glenbrook Hospital and its food service vendor, Aramark, to bring excess cafeteria food from the hospital to the Northfield Food Pantry (NFP). Excess food is stored and picked up once a week by NFP volunteers and taken to the facility. Some of the recovered items include prepackaged sandwiches and "grab and go" items like

expression of interest from community members. We hope this to be a transparent and communicative process." The parcel is zoned for open space and any commercial redevelopment would require a public hearing.

#### Jacobs Homes, 1179-1291 Shermer

The first phase of construction of the 68 unit townhouse development by Jacobs Homes is underway, including the installation of the underground storm detention system. Building permits cannot be issued until those improvements are in place, according to Village staff. Building permits for their first 10 units have been submitted.

#### Jet International, 1919 Stanley Street

The Glenview-based aircraft parts supplier received a 6b Cook County tax break earlier this year to move to the site previously occupied by Maurice Sporting Goods. Currently the company is preparing building permit drawings to upgrade the facility and move into the space next year.

#### Joy of the Game

A proposal was recently submitted by North

Shore Sports and Wellness (NSSW) to locate a multi-use sports complex at a property in the Sky Harbor Business park at 555 Huehl Road. NSSW proposes redeveloping the existing 78,500 square foot building to accommodate the relocation of Joy of the Game and several other sports-related businesses and a school that they currently operate in Deerfield. According to the Village, NSSW completed their first round of reviews; a parking and traffic study were also submitted. Technical issues need to be resolved before a public hearing can be scheduled by the Plan Commission.

#### Life Time Athletic Northbrook, 1100 Skokie Blvd.

Construction on the 89,000 square foot fitness facility is nearing completion. An on-site trailer has been set up offering a "virtual tour" of the center and for anyone interested in signing up for discounted member rates. LifeTime anticipates an opening late this month or early November.

#### 1000 Skokie Boulevard Apartments

Framing for the five-story apartment complex with 304 luxury units is well

underway. The six-story precast parking deck that can accommodate 642 vehicles has been completed. No target date for opening has been officially announced, but it is expected to be sometime in 2019. Totalling 593,824 square feet, the development will feature a brick and fiber cement exterior. As part of the 1000 Skokie Boulevard development, improvements are being made that will include widening the pavement on Skokie and installation of a dedicated right-turn lane from Sunset Ridge to southbound Skokie.

#### The Lodge, 2220 Founders Drive

The Phase IV building is expected to open this month. Final inspections are underway for individual units as they are completed. The project consists of 60 senior units, including 16 assisted living. Construction began in May 2016.

#### Lurie Children's Hospital Surgical Center, 1131 Techy Road

The opening of the new 26,000 square foot outpatient surgical center is expected later this month. Currently there is a temporary

## Updated Membership Records Ensure Accurate Referrals

When was the last time you looked on the Chamber website to check the accuracy of your membership listing? Have you changed the name of your business, moved or do you have a new website? Is your company description written so that it will come up in a website search? Is any information missing?

If you had trouble answering any of these questions, or if you joined the Chamber when some of this information may not have been included, the Chamber would like to encourage you to take a minute to look at your membership listing to ensure it is accurate and complete. To check the accuracy of your membership records, log onto the Chamber website [www.northbrookchamber.org](http://www.northbrookchamber.org) and search for your business name. Review all the fields and check the link to your website. It's important to remember Chamber referrals are all based on this information.

In addition to reviewing your contact information, members are reminded to take

full advantage of the ability to use up to 600 characters (around 50 words) to describe their business. This offers an opportunity to explain more about a business specialty and for members to differentiate themselves from their competitors. In addition to an accurate and up-to-date business description, members should also make sure they list keywords, which will improve search results both on the Chamber's website and with major search engines such as Google, Yahoo and Bing.

A convenient way to update your membership records is through the Members Only page of the Chamber website. Once logged onto the page, you can click on the "Company Information" link on the drop down menu. If you do not have a Username and Password, e-mail [info@northbrookchamber.org](mailto:info@northbrookchamber.org) and a link will be sent to you. Or feel free to call the Chamber at (847)498-5555 and a staff member will be glad to make the changes.

As a reminder, all employee or

personnel changes must be made by the Chamber. If you have had changes in your staffing, please call or e-mail the Chamber and any staff person can make the updates. Be sure to include e-mail addresses so the individuals can receive the Chamber's monthly e-Announcements and Friday e-mail. Please note that e-mails provided to the Chamber are not sold, given out, or listed in any publication.

yogurt, soup, and entrees in pans.

An initiative to establish similar partnerships with food service providers at corporate cafeterias is being led by Chamber President Tensley Garris. Together with her volunteer team, efforts will be made to identify five businesses who can participate, evaluate how the program could work for them, then move into implementation.

One of the target areas will be to improve student food insecurity, as there are gaps in the food supply for children from low income families on weekends, holidays, and during school breaks. School officials estimate that nearly 400 Northbrook students are eligible for the school's free lunch program. Combined with students at Glenbrook South, the number grows to around 1,000. Leaders from all five of Northbrook's school districts and from many of Northbrook's churches and synagogues are spearheading an effort to bridge the gap.

Bob Caldwell, Hallmark Homecare, will lead another pilot project that will provide eligible seniors at Crestwood Place with transportation to the Food Pantry. If successful, the program would be expanded to other clusters of seniors.

Another group of volunteers is developing a communication strategy to build awareness of the work being done and to promote the specific solutions. The communications strategy includes developing an on-line calendar to coordinate food supply and demand, identify all food supply programs, and coordinate volunteer registration. The online calendar will be a part of a larger Hunger Free Northbrook website that highlights resources and ways to get involved.

Eventually the goal will be for other communities to model what is going on in Northbrook. Fetta notes that HRN leaders will be sharing their lessons learned and presenting their story at the annual national Alliance to End Hunger Hunger Free Community Conference in Minneapolis this month. "Our goal is to connect with other communities to learn from them and share our journey." occupancy permit allowing them to furnish the facility, but a final occupancy permit has not been granted. Located next to the Lurie outpatient center, the facility includes four operating rooms, an MRI, five exam rooms and 14 private rooms for pre- and post-operative care for pediatric patients.

**Maple School, School District 30**

Construction of the new Maple School is proceeding on schedule, within budget, and is on track to open in the fall of 2019 according to school officials. The project has received help from several neighbors. Homeowners in the La Salceda del Norte neighborhood are allowing the District to utilize their water detention area. Wintrust Bank has provided temporary office space at a discounted rate for the District Office at Northview Community Bank, and District 225 is providing contractor parking and supported a land swap. **Pyramid Packaging, 2901 Shermer Rd.**

Construction of a new 8,092 square foot building, as part of an expansion that will double the size of the current building to 13,500 square feet, is underway. Earlier this year Trustees voted in favor of granting Pyramid a 6b tax incentive for the project. The project is expected to be completed in two years.

After a year and a half of construction, Wiss Janney recently announced the opening of its new Janney Technical Center, a 70,000 square foot state-of-the-art testing and applied research facility that consolidates all of its lab space under one roof. The new center is one of the largest and most advanced private materials testing and research facilities in the country, and includes a full array of chemistry, petrography, metallurgy, concrete and mortar, corrosion, and structural testing laboratories as well as environmental exposure chambers.
