State Rolls Out “Secure Choice” Retirement Savings Program

Illinois employers with 25 or more employees are now required to either offer a retirement plan or register employees with a new state-managed plan. Implementation of the Illinois Secure Choice Savings Program Act has taken place in three stages: companies over 500 employees began registering staff members in November 2018, followed by employers with 100-499 in July 2019 and those with 25-99 in November 2019. While the law is intended to require few resources from employers, it is important to understand employers’ responsibilities as well as options available to employees.

The law established the Secure Choice retirement savings program, for which a default amount of 5% of an employee’s gross pay is deducted and invested by the state in a Roth IRA for the employee. Eligible employees include full-time and part-time workers over the age of 18 who work within Illinois. Seasonal employees are also covered if they work more than 60 days for the employer.

Employers act as facilitators of the program by registering each eligible employee with the state and transferring the deducted funds to the state-run account. Deductions must begin 30 days after the employee is registered and must be received by the state within seven days.

Recreational Marijuana Dispensary Proposed

Northbrook’s Trustees expressed general approval for a preliminary application to establish the Village’s first-ever recreational marijuana dispensary. The proposal from Grassroots Cannabis follows on the heels of a recent discussion by Trustees that favored allowing a limited number of cannabis businesses made possible by Illinois’ new recreational marijuana legislation.

If approved, the new Grassroots business will be located at the northeast corner of Dundee Road and Skokie

Boulevard, on two lots occupied by a closed gas station and the former Rehabilitation Institute of Chicago (RIC) building. Although specific plans have not yet been submitted, the proposal envisions significant renovations of the 11,000 square foot RIC structure for use as the cannabis sales space and other ancillary functions, as well as demolition of the gas station to make way for an improved parking lot and landscaping.

Chamber Seeks Interested Board Candidates

The Nominating Committee of the Chamber's Board of Directors is identifying members who might be interested in serving on the Board, beginning in January 2020. The Board is the Chamber's governing body, with representatives from a diverse range of industries and business sizes. Each month, Board members meet to discuss direction, share ideas, and set goals for the organization's activities.

According to materials submitted to the Village, Grassroots was founded in Highland Park and has grown into one of the country's largest legal cannabis companies. Grassroots' affiliated enterprises include dispensaries and cultivation and processing facilities in 11 states. It operates Greenhouse in Deerfield, one of 55 existing medical dispensaries in Illinois. The Illinois recreational cannabis law allows medical dispensary operators to open recreational retail stores that are "secondary" to their medical outlets, streamlining the licensing process.

The Trustees' comments reflected a positive reaction to the project, although some questions were raised. Many Trustees were pleased that a gateway to

the Village would have an updated, attractive structure taking the place of unkempt vacant buildings.

Trustee Kathryn Ciesla commented, "This seems to me to be an outstanding location for this use. I was really impressed with the application materials that they submitted."

Reservations about traffic patterns were noted by

President Sandy Frum and Trustee Johannah Hebl, who remarked on the "treacherous" traffic at that busy intersection. Trustee Jason Han stated his concern that patrons might be using marijuana on the premises and then accessing the nearby expressway. Trustee Heather Ross said in response that it was not unlike having businesses that serve alcohol in the same area.

Tom Poupard, Development and Planning Services Director, noted that it is unclear whether the company intended to have onsite cannabis consumption as part of its business. He affirmed that consumption would be something that the Village has the power to regulate.

The application was referred to the Plan Commission for future review.

Employees have the ability to adjust the amount of deductions or to opt-out of the program entirely. Once an account is established, it moves with the employee from job to job. Each employee's account is managed through the program's website, www.ilsecurechoice.com, and is outside the employer's control.

In essence, the law is intended to encourage retirement savings by workers without placing a financial burden on employers. However, management should expect that employees will turn to them with questions about the deductions being made from paychecks.

Employment law attorney Susan Troester, LaPointe Law, encourages employers to be proactive as the

requirements are being implemented. "First of all, if you already offer an employer-sponsored retirement savings plan to your employees, you need not participate in the program. If you do not presently offer a retirement plan, consider doing so," says Troester. "If you elect not to offer your own plan, Secure Choice will contact you to register your business. In the meantime, I recommend visiting the Employer page of the Secure Choice website. You will find all of the forms you need to provide to your employees, as well as employer-focused information about the program."

Park District Projects Move Forward

With a ceremonial groundbreaking in July, the Northbrook Park District took a tangible step toward construction of its new Activity Center at Techny Prairie & Parks. The multi-purpose center is one of three significant projects planned for the community pursuant to the District's comprehensive master plan and "New Places to Play" initiative. In addition to the Activity Center, the initiative calls for major renovations to Sportsman's Country Club in 2020 and as-yet-undetermined updates to Meadowhill Park.

The new \$16 million Activity Center, scheduled to open in early 2021, will be located at Techny Road and Anets Drive, overlooking the Techny Prairie Park baseball fields and Anetsberger Golf Course. The 44,200 square foot facility addresses wellness goals for all ages, with an indoor track, a gym for basketball, pickleball and volleyball, fitness spaces for cardio, strength training, and group fitness, and a multipurpose room for classes and programs. Residents will be able to take advantage of childcare services and locker rooms with showers when using the Center.

"While the building is not yet standing, we envision a space where friendships are made, hobbies discovered, and personal goals achieved," says Molly Hamer, Park District Executive Director. "This will be an exciting and active space, a place to unwind and connect with others."

For golfers, the end of the 2019 season will bring major changes to the courses and facilities at Sportsman's. The club will be closed throughout 2020 in order to replace the greens on the Classic 18 course and improve irrigation on the East 9. Updates will be made to the practice range, and a new clubhouse will offer a new, welcoming dining experience 12 months a year. The \$12.5 million project will be funded solely by the Park District; discussions of a private/public partnership were explored but ultimately rejected. Plans are being made to ensure that Northbrook golfers have options to play during the 2020 season.

your description, add them to the keyword list. There's no need to repeat words that are already part of your business name or profile.

While you're reviewing your description on the website, consider some of the other opportunities offered by the Chamber to raise your visibility. For example, you can add a special offer to our Hot Deals listings -- a free advertising benefit included in your membership. Banner ads and secondary categories are included with Gold and Platinum memberships, and also available at a low cost to standard members.
